## PRINCIPAL'S CORNER



Mr. Geary, principal at Watertown High School, recognizes and encourages the many good things happening right now at the high school. He sees potential and is capitalizing on the talents of the students to benefit and build on the achievements already accomplished by the school environment.

The building project is making progress with the library/media center, gym, and auditorium. Furniture has been added in the library and books have been received. The auditorium has housed many events so far this year even though the lights have yet to be installed. The gym floor was lined and waxed, and it has been turned over to gym classes and school sports. The new locker rooms started being used on October 13<sup>th</sup> and new classrooms are currently in use.

Faculty members worked on a Positive Behavior Supports program during three days of professional development in late August. They encourage and support the school-wide critical thinking rubric, which states the areas of critical thinking on which the students will be assessed.

Mr. Geary, Mrs. Bartholomeo, Mrs. Kuegler, and Mrs. Kreuzer gave a presentation entitled "Cultivating Change Using School-Wide Rubrics" at the NEASC Model School Showcase on October 14<sup>th</sup>. The work by the entire staff was recognized by NEASC, and they wanted the Watertown staff members to present the ideas. Watertown is proud to have rubrics and assessments that are consistent and educational.
